World Tsunami Awareness Day

Theme: To promote awareness on Tsunami Science, Warning and Mitigation

The Ministry of Lands and Natural Resources with support from the Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO (IOC) organized several programs to promote awareness on Tsunami Science, Warning and Mitigation. The IOC is the United Nations body responsible for supporting global ocean science and services and supports its Member States achieve their global goals including the UN Agenda 2030 and its Sustainable Development Goals, the Paris Agreement on Climate Change and the Sendai Framework on Disaster Risk Reduction.

To promote awareness, five (5) competitions were organized by the Natural Resources Division and coordinated with the Tonga Meteorological Services and National Emergency Management Office. The competitions included Poster Competitions for classes 1 – 3, Poetry Competitions for classes 3 – 6, Speech Competitions for Forms 1 – 4, Quiz Competitions for Forms 5 – 7 and a Tsunami Model Design Competition for High School Students taking Design Technology Classes.

In addition to the competitions targeted at students, the three agencies hosted Radio Talk Back shows and TV programs to spread awareness on tsunami science, warning and mitigation across Tonga.

On November 12th 2021, the Ministry of Lands and Natural Resources observed World Tsunami Awareness Day at the Queen Salote Memorial Hall together with various Ministries, Diplomatic Missions, Development Partners, NGOs and the general public.

During the keynote address, the Acting Minister for Lands and Natural Resources and focal Minister for UNESCO, Honourable Hu'akavameiliku shared a message from the Head of the United Nations Disaster Risk Reduction, Ms Mami Mizutori

"In a major boost to international cooperation to developing countries and Small Island Developing States, the UNESCO-IOC assembly of UN Member States has approved the establishment of the ocean decade tsunami programme which will contribute to the safe ocean outcome of the ocean decade by making 100% of communities at risk of tsunami, prepared and resilient by 2030."

Tonga has strengthened its preparedness and early action through collaboration of key agencies from Government and Civil Society Associations. Various actions have been taken such as revising the National Tsunami Plan and conduct drills regularly and ensuring national infrastructure and public utilities are also strengthened so that communities can become resilient in the face of adversity. This includes the constructing of multi-purpose community halls and evacuation halls throughout Tonga which contributes to Tsunami Evacuation Planning.

16 Days of Activism against Gender–Based Violence

Theme: Get help during lockdown - Stop Violence Against Women & Illicit Drug



The Ministry of Internal Affairs as the guardian of the Tonga Family Protection Act, 2013 has been spearheading changes and adaptation to the current situation of Tonga; curfews between 12:00am – 5:00am such as the launching of the Tonga National Service Delivery Protocol for responding to cases of Gender—Based Violence in March, 2021 that targets government and non—government efforts to determine systematic mechanism which empowers consensus and comprehensive collaborations among stakeholders of gender—based violence, to either provider the survivors with relevant and quality services according to their needs; or to comprehensively refer them to the appropriate service providers.

His Majesty, King Tupou VI declared Tonga's War on Drugs, the 2021 parliamentary session include illicit drugs as the many challenges that Tongan faces today. His Majesty also opened a 2-day National Symposium on Illicit Drugs in October, War on Drugs has been prioritized starting with the government toughen up of the drug laws by amending the Illicit Drug aimed to control illicit drugs use especially the use of methamphetamine. The Former Minister of Justice stated that "ice is Tonga killing virus, not COVID-19.

Since 2005, the Women's Affairs & Gender Equality Division, Ministry of Internal Affairs and key stakeholders have always marked the beginning of the 16 Days of Activism against Gender Based Violence Campaign on November 25th the International Day for Elimination of Violence Against Women & White Ribbon Day. This include other important dates within the 16 Days Campaign that will be marked through various advocacy programs and activities:

CEO Re-Appointment - Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Forests



The Public Service Commission is pleased to announce the successful re-appointment of Dr. Viliami Toalei Manu of Kolofo'ou, Tongatapu as the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) for the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Forests with effect from o1st November, 2021 for a period of two (2) years.

Dr Manu holds a Doctor of Philosophy in Soil Science (2001) from the University of New England, Australia. He holds a Master of Science (second class Honours) in Analytical Chemistry (1989) from the University of Canterbury, New Zealand and has also attained a Bachelor of Science majoring in Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry (1982) from Massey University, New Zealand.

Dr Manu's career in the public service began in 1983 when he was appointed as an Agricultural Officer at the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forests. Since then, he has

taken over senior positions within the Ministry including Senior Soil Chemist (1991), Principal Soil Scientist (1994) and later to the Chief Plant Pathologist position. He was appointed as the Chief Executive Officer for Agriculture, Food and Forests on 11th October 2016 where he continued to serve until the end of his contract on the 10th October 2020. Dr Manu is also a dedicated National Pesticide Registrar with extensive experience in managing the import, provision of statistics, advice and trainings on safety of Pesticides into Tonga. He is also Tonga's National Codex Contact Point for the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO)/ World Health Organisation (WHO) Codex Alimentarius Commission since 2007 and the National Codex Contact for the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) Genetic Modified Platform since 2014.

Dr Manu has sat on various professional committees namely the Chemical Review Committee of the Rotterdam Convention's Conference of the Parties as well as the Designated National Authority for Tonga for the Rotterdam Convention on the Prior Informed Consent Procedure for Certain Hazardous Pesticides in International Trade since 2012.

The Public Service Commission congratulates Dr Viliami Toalei Manu on his re-appointment as Chief Executive Officer for Agriculture, Food and Forests and looks forward to his continued contribution to the Government and the people of Tonga.

Talatalanoa Program & Sexual Harassment Training for Ha'apai

The PSC Talatalanoa program was successfully conducted to all Line Ministries in Ha'apai on the 22nd– 25th November, 2021. This is an important program which allows the PSC Office to present and discuss with the staff of all Government Ministries, policies and instructions. This is also an opportunity to share and discuss a new policy on Sexual Harassment. The purpose of this policy is to ensure that employees are protected from sexual harassment in the workplace. Our visit provided clear guidance to all employees in any Government Ministry (Schedule 1), to raise awareness amongst all employees about how to identify the behaviors, actions and circumstance of sexual harassment, to provide clear guidance for processing sexual harassment complaints within the Public Service and to promote and maintain a safe and healthy workplace, where all employees, irrespective of gender or position, are treated with fairness, dignity and respect. The PSC staff were able to capture and note the concerns, recommendations and issues of employees in the Ha'apau Islands for our necessary actions.

PSC wishes to acknowledge the Asian Development Bank who partnered with PSC and funded local consultant, Ofa Guttenbeil Likiliki of the Women and Children's Crisis Centre, who is no stranger to this field, to assist PSC with this training. Law Week

Theme: Social Media and the Law

The Attorney General's Office commemorated Law Week 2021 from 21 – 26 November 2021 with the theme, "Social Media and the Law." The objective of Law Week was to spread awareness to the public about the legislation and regulations applicable to social media. Of particular relevance was the Electronic Communications Abuse Offences Act (ECAO), was passed in 2020 but came into effect on 1st of July, 2021. This Act addresses the use of any communication platform to abuse, harass or harm a person especially on social media.

Law Week commenced with a Sunday service at the Church of Tonga at Kilikali and was led by Reverend Dr Tuʻipulotu Katoanga. Distinguished guests included the Honorable Prime Minister, Acting Lord Chief Justice, Magistrates, Lord Privy Seal, Excellencies and Senior Government Officials.

Throughout the week, the Office then held various awareness programs and invited the participation of the general public. This included an Open Day Program at Digicel Square, Nuku'alofa on 22 November 2021. The Guest of Honour, Honourable Poasi Tei officially launched the Open Day Program. The highlight of the program was the display of booths from relevant government and non-government stakeholders and the awarding of prizes to winning participants in the Poster, Poetry, Essay and TikTok/ Short Video Competitions.

Another initiative included office tours. The Office had invited secondary and tertiary students to participate in these tours. Overall, there was a huge turnout and students were given a glimpse into the specialties of each Division in the Office through presentations and a walk-through tour of the whole Office. The highlight of the tours was the involvement of students and their eagerness to learn more about the Office's work. On a side note, students were also given the opportunity to try out the lawyer court attire consisting of a wig, gown, bib and bar jacket.

The Office also aimed to expand the reach of Law Week 2021 through television and radio programs. Representatives from Tonga Police and the Computer Emergency Response Team (CERT Tonga) were invited to converse and discuss issues relevant to social media and the law.

Finally, the Office saw it necessary to involve the outer islands by conducting outreach programs to Vava'u, Ha'apai and 'Eua. The outreach tours in Vava'u and Ha'apai have been completed and the 'Eua outreach will be held from 13 – 15 December 2021. Overall, it was well received, with a decent turnout and queries from members of the public.

Census 2021 data collection done and dusted!

The Tonga Statistics Department (TSD) has completed the most work-intensive phase of the Population and Housing Census 2021; data collection, this month right in time for the Christmas holidays.

Preparations: All year long TSD has been prepping for the data collection phase on **November 30**th as a reference point. Not even the current global situation could stop the Census 2021 preparations.

Much work went into the preparations such as planning and logistics, procurement, recruitment and ensuring collaboration and consultation with stakeholders. From the re-boundary consultations and work, Steering Committee meetings, stakeholder meetings, Census Committee and technical team meetings, TSD wanted to ensure that the Population and Household Census 2021 reflects the department's commitment to providing quality user-driven information.

Outreach: This commitment was also shown in TSD's increased focus on public outreach, with tv programs once a month, joining other organizations' events, going out to schools and villages throughout all of Tonga to explain the importance of information gathering and evidence-based decision making, especially related to the Census 2021.

Census Questions: The Census Questionnaires 2021 used the Census 2016's questions as a baseline, then through the committees in the established Census governance structure, questionnaire questions were customized. The questions asked of the public during the data collection period; **November 29th – December 4th** were approved and finalized by the Census Steering Committee, which composes of stakeholders from Government ministries, NGOs, and regional and international partners such as SPC and UN agencies.

All questions asked were necessary and reflected data needs which will help stakeholders in development plan and policy.

Relevancy: The data collected from the Census 2021 is, like the previous censuses, very vital for the decision-making in Tonga. Census 2021 information lets the decision-makers know of the people; how many we are, who we are, where we live and our social and economic situation for development, aid and projects
